

Disturbing drawings by children recently held in migrant detention centers showing sad figures in cages have been released by the American Academy of Pediatrics, which last week [warned of longterm trauma](#) faced by immigrant children separated from parents or guardians under the Trump administration's border policies.

The pictures were drawn last week by unaccompanied 10 and 11-year-old migrant children after being released from [LRI](#) Customs and Border Protection (CBP) custody. They were obtained by [NBC News](#) which said they were provided to the AAP by a social worker in Texas.

"The fact that the drawings are so realistic and horrific gives us a view into what these children have experienced," Dr Colleen Kraft, former president of the AAP, [told CNN](#). "When a child draws this, it's telling us that child felt like he or she was in jail."

In its policy statement released last week, the academy warned that the welfare of immigrant children seeking safe haven in the United States, whether arriving unaccompanied or in family units, is of "great concern to pediatricians and other advocates for children".

The academy warned that Department of Homeland Security facilities used to accommodate unaccompanied children "do not meet the basic standards for the care of children in residential settings".

Our in-depth interviews with children revealed that the US Border Patrol is holding many children, including some who are much too young to take care of themselves, in jail-like border facilities for weeks at a time without contact with family members, or regular access to showers, clean clothes, toothbrushes, or proper beds. Many were sick. Many, including children as young as 2 or 3, were separated from adult caretakers without any provisions for their care besides that provided by unrelated older children also being held in detention. These conditions are consistent with those Human Rights Watch documented in our February 2018 report, "In the Freezer." [\[5\]](#) In contrast with the conditions as of February 2018, the harms of CBP detention for children are now compounding over weeks instead of days.

Lack of Adult Caregivers

On my first day at Clint, I spoke with an 11-year-old boy who was caring for his 3-year-old brother. Both were fending for themselves in cinder-block cells with dozens of other children for three weeks. [\[6\]](#) When I met them, the little one was quiet with matted hair, a hacking cough, muddy pants and eyes that fluttered closed with fatigue. As we spoke, he fell asleep on two office chairs drawn together. "I am the one who takes care of him here," the older brother told us. "There was a teenage girl with curly hair who was helping me take care of him for a while. I don't know her name. But she's gone now. Now, no one helps me to take care of him."

A 14-year-old told our team she was taking care of a 4-year-old girl who had been placed in her cell with no relatives. "I take her to the bathroom, give her my extra food if she is hungry, and tell people to leave her alone if they are bothering her," she said. "She has been sick the whole time I have been taking care of her, and is coughing and has mucous. She doesn't talk hardly at all, just 'yes' and 'no.' She wears diapers and I change them for her."

What type of quality of life is being provided for these children? Is it acceptable, why/why not?

The issue	Sanctity of life response
1. Abortion - <i>the deliberate termination of a human pregnancy, most often performed during the first 28 weeks of pregnancy</i>
