By the mid-1950s, the U.S.-Soviet Cold War had worked its way into the fabric of everyday life in both countries, **fuelled by the arms race and the growing threat of nuclear weapons, wide-ranging espionage (spying) and counter-espionage between the two countries**, war in Korea and a clash of words and ideas carried out in the media.

The tensions would continue throughout the space race, aggravated by such events as the construction of the Berlin Wall in 1961, the Cuban missile crisis of 1962 and the outbreak of war in Southeast Asia. **Space exploration served as another dramatic arena for Cold War competition.**

Who won the Space Race?



USA

Eisenhower rush to launch satellite but this failed 'caput-nik'

Explorer successfully launched

May 1961 - announcement of getting man on moon. Apollo programme succeeded with 1969

John Glen in orbit Feb 1962- first man to do this.



USSR

Oct 1957- Sputnik- first satellite that started the race (not first technology, as this was Germany)

August 1957 inter ballistic missile first tested

Yuri 1961 April first man in space

NEITHER

Brezhnev and Nixon sorted to cooperation rather than competition - gifts exchanged and friendship started.
